

Useful Information for Finding a Host Organisation Erasmus+ Traineeship – University of Tuscia

Finding a Host Organisation

Students participating in the Erasmus+ Traineeship programme must independently identify a host organisation where they will carry out their traineeship.

To support students in this process, the [Erasmus+](#) page on the UNITUS website also provides a file containing a list of organisations that have previously hosted students from the University of Tuscia. This list is intended only as a source of inspiration. Students are free to contact any suitable organisation, even if it is not included in the list.

Once a host organisation has agreed to host you, you will need to ask them to complete and sign the “Letter of Acceptance”, which is required to apply for the Erasmus+ Traineeship call.

Eligible Host Organisations

The following types of organisations can host an Erasmus+ traineeship:

- public or private companies (small, medium or large)
- local, regional or national public bodies
- research institutes
- foundations
- schools and educational or training centres
- non-profit organisations, associations and NGOs
- universities and higher education institutions
- chambers of commerce and professional associations
- organisations providing career guidance or employment services

Not eligible:

- European Union institutions and bodies
- organisations managing EU programmes, including Erasmus+ National Agencies

How to Contact an Organisation

Once you have identified an organisation of interest, you can contact them by email and send:

- your Curriculum Vitae
- a short motivation or cover letter
- a short description of the Erasmus+ Traineeship programme for host organisations (available on the [Erasmus+](#) page of the UNITUS website)

In your message, you should briefly explain:

- who you are
- what you study
- why you are interested in the organisation
- the possible traineeship period

How to Search for a Host Organisation

Online research

The internet is one of the main tools for finding internship opportunities. You can:

- search for organisations operating in your field of interest
- regularly check the “Careers”, “Jobs”, “Internships” or “Vacancies” sections of company websites
- consult specialised internship portals
